May 18 - John Sullivan - Down the Wide Missouri; a photographic presentation of his 2,340 mile trip down the Missouri River. He will discuss some of the issues facing this great river from the Gates of the Rocky Mountains to the Mississippi River.

John is a paddling/poling enthusiast who enjoys extended solo canoe trips. His excursions started in the late 1990s and were focused primarily in Wisconsin. John's initial interest was to follow the paths of early explorers and voyageurs in their journeys from the Great Lakes to the Mississippi. Over the past decade he has paddled several thousand miles and has descended the lengths of the state-named rivers that flow to the Mississippi including the Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Ohio and Missouri.

John has spent his lifetime on rivers. He grew up paddling the flat waters of the Rock River at Horicon, attended the University of Minnesota on the banks of the Mississippi and earned his master's degree studying the Big Eau Pleine River in north central Wisconsin. His working hours are spent as a water quality specialist monitoring and protecting the water quality of the Mississippi River for the Wisconsin DNR at La Crosse. His leisure time is

Coulee Audubon president bitten by birder bug in 1995

Dan Jackson, Coulee Region Audubon president, grew up in La Crosse and graduated from Central High School in 1979. He graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1984 with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration and Computer Science.

Immediately after college, Dan worked as a Programmer and Programmer Analyst for First Interstate Bank in Sheboygan, WI. After 2 years, he and his wife moved to the La Crosse area where he went to work as a Business Analyst for the G. Heileman Brewing Company. During his 5 years at Heileman, he also earned an MBA from UW-La Crosse. From Heileman, Dan moved to LaCrosse Footwear in 1991 where he was responsible for the company's manufacturing computer systems and also became responsible for the company's PCs. He eventually built

the company's computer network and became the Manager of Network Planning. He continued at Footwear for 11 years until the company's corporate headquarters were moved to Portland, Oregon. He decided to stay in the Coulee Region and in 2002 he accepted his current position as the IT Manager for the L. B. White Company in Onalaska.

Dan was bitten by the birding bug in the spring of 1995. On family walks in the woods and marshes he rekindled his interest in birds and started to notice species that he had never seen before. A trip to Alaska and field trips in the Myrick Marsh and Hixon Forest led by Pat and Bobbi Wilson added more fuel and sealed his addiction. Over the past 15 years, he has become an avid birder and dragonfly enthusiast and has also taken up wildlife photography. He has birded extensively throughout the state of Wisconsin and the Midwest and has also birded in several other states throughout the country when

family vacations and work trips have made that possible.

Dan describes himself as a concerned amateur naturalist. He has participated in many volunteer research activities and citizen science projects including the USGS Breeding Bird Survey, the Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas, Wisconsin DNR Owl, Nightjar, Kirtland's Warbler, Frog, and Red-shouldered Hawk Surveys, the Wisconsin Odonata Survey, Christmas Bird Counts, and the Great Backyard Bird Count. He is the compiler for the La Crosse Christmas Bird Count, has led dozens of birding field trips, and has given dozens of presentations on birds, birding, and the art of Digiscoping to local groups and organizations.

An amateur wildlife photographer, Dan has taken pictures of over 400 species of birds, insects, and other animals. His photos have been published in the Wisconsin Natural Resources magazine, the WSO Journal, and the Big River Magazine.


MVC to benefit from WSO auction
