It's the best time of year for birders, and this is a short list of the many chances to get out there and see what's happening in the forests, fields, rivers and bluffs.

April 13 - Annual Midwest Crane Count - 5:30 a.m.-7:30 a.m. The Annual Midwest Crane Count is one of the largest citizen-based wildlife surveys in the world. One of the primary purposes of the Crane Count is to monitor the abundance and distribution of cranes in the Upper Midwest. Each year, the Crane Count involves over 3,000 volunteers spread over 100 counties in six states. The Crane Count is organized by county in Wisconsin and portions of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, and Minnesota.

Chimney Swift Roost Counts

Chimney Swifts will be arriving from their South American wintering range very soon! As of today, they have been spotted as far north as Toledo and Cleveland on Lake Erie.

As part of a program of the [Wisconsin Chimney Swift Working Group](#), I am looking for swift enthusiasts to help monitor roosting sites in La Crosse and the nearby Driftless area. You don't have to be a birder to participate in this fun citizen science effort!

These fascinating aerial birds have taken to depend on human-made vertical hollow structures (chimneys and air vents) to roost communally during both spring and fall migration, and even during the summer nesting season.

Please consider becoming a **Volunteer Swift Roost Counter this year!** It is fun and this is how it works:

- We will attempt simultaneous roost counts at known locations in the City of La Crosse on suitable nights between May and August.
- A count takes about 50 minutes to an hour, starting 20 minutes or earlier before sunset, and ending about 30 minutes after sunset.
- You work in small teams to record only the number of swifts entering the roost, not those in the air, and share your results with the group and/or on eBird.
- No need to be a birder, no binoculars needed.
- More details and training counts will be provided in late April.

Your participation will help to get a more detailed picture of shifting roost use by both migrating and nesting populations. Contact Stefan Gleissberg if you are interested at stefan_gleissberg@me.com
